Where to find Digital Textbooks



Digital Books for learners with print disabilities

There is a legal obligation on schools and local authorities, under the Equality Act, to provide pupils with accessible versions of learning materials. This is not an optional extra – it is a reasonable adjustment under the legislation. If a learner cannot access textbooks or learning materials in the usual printed format, the school / local authority is required to source, or create, an accessible version. For example, this could be a Large Print paper version, or a Braille version, or a digital version.


Learners who have difficulty accessing printed textbooks because of a disability are legally entitled to be provided with versions in formats that they can read and access. A 'print disability' can arise because of visual impairment, dyslexia or other reading difficulty, hearing impairment or specific language disorder, a learning disability, or physical impairment. Note the English as an Additional Language is not classed as a print disability.

So, how can schools and local authorities fulfil this legal obligation?

Books for All Scotland Database


School staff in Scotland can download digital books free of charge from CALL Scotland's <u>Books for All</u> <u>Scotland Database</u>. The database can be accessed using your Glow login, or with your school's Scran account. The database has a range of files covering all ages and stages, mostly in PDF format. There are some Large Print books that you can download and print out.

The Books for All Scotland Database has digital versions of Scottish Heinemann Maths, TeeJay and Hodder Gibson. The SHM and some of the TeeJay books have 'answer' boxes where learners can type answers on screen.



RNIB Education Collection

The <u>RNIB UK Education Collection</u> provides textbooks and materials for learners with print disabilities across the UK. It is free to join. The collection has many more files (82,000 at time of writing) than the Books for All Scotland Database and RNIB have arrangements with most of the UK school textbook publishers whereby they can source PDFs of most current textbooks, so if the book you want is not there, it can often be sourced from the publisher.



The Seeing Ear / National Accessible Library

The <u>Seeing Ear National Accessible Library</u> is a charity providing a database of books for anyone in the UK who is visually impaired or has a print disability. It is free to join. Most of the titles are fiction and reading books, although it does have some textbooks.
